

SKY AT NIGHT

Moon Phases

Planets

Mars is the only planet on view during the evening now passing through the constellation of Leo and setting at Iam. In the early morning Saturn rises at 2am, followed by the shining beacon which is Venus at 3am.

Constellation

Late evening find a clear southern horizon and look for the constellation of Scorpius the scorpion. The stars that create the asterism Scorpius actually resemble a scorpion, from England we can see its claws rising to the west but further south its tail and sting are much more visible. The brightest star in the constellation is the very prominent red supergiant Antares. The name deriving from the Greek meaning to rival Ares. In other words Antares is the rival of Mars, due of course to its similar colour.

Phenomena

On the 16th/17th red Mars will pass above the bright white star Regulus in the constellation of Leo, a great sight in binoculars. Then on the 21st we have the summer solstice and experience the longest day and shortest night of the year.

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. At the time of writing in the middle of May, the fields that were being cultivated were having maize drilled. This is one of the last crops to be sown/drilled. In fact, it is precision drilled in that one seed goes down the tube and is planted at a certain distance from the next seed. You can see the effect of this in a stand of maize. The plants are evenly spaced down rows that are quite far apart – typically half a metre. Cereals are sown with different drills. There is bunching or crowding within the rows which are closer together.


Rewilding. There is a huge estate in Scotland and a farm in England that are totally devoted to this. With our level of home produced food at about 60% of our needs, land being lost to solar panels and wind turbines and the unprecedented rise in population that has been seen in the last two years, it does seem inappropriate to take more land out of production. Rewilding does benefit wild life but eating is important as well. In times of difficulty, we will

not be able to import all that we need. These are huge pressures on farmland use. Likewise, the current government wants to put trees on 19% of the country. Lots of pressures on farmland. Someone has to pay for rewilding. Wildfires are on the increase around the world. Removing vegetation is the best insurance against this. Rewilding does the opposite. In Somerset, we have lots of hedges which are wild places. *Richard Graham*

Ashley Fox, MP for Middlezoy and Othery Why Local Voices Matter in Planning for Somerset's Future



The Government's new Planning and Infrastructure Bill aims to speed up the delivery of homes and infrastructure — a goal I support. But it must not come at the cost of local democracy or proper scrutiny. The Bill would centralise planning powers, allowing the Secretary of State or unelected officers to bypass local councillors. It means residents in places like Middlezoy and Othery could lose their say in decisions that shape their communities.

We've already felt the challenges of centralisation. Since Sedgemoor District Council was

merged into Somerset Council, planning has become slower, less responsive, knowledge has been lost and frustration is growing. It hasn't helped that since 2022, the council has been run by the Liberal Democrats, whose handling of the transition has left much to be desired. The Bill also allows developers to pay into a national nature fund instead of assessing local environmental impact. That might work elsewhere, but Somerset's unique ecosystems, from wetlands to rivers, demand site-specific care.

We do need more homes but with the right roads, schools, surgeries, and green space. Local farmers also need protection from sweeping compulsory purchase powers.

OTHERY BOOK READING GROUP

If nobody speaks of remarkable things by Jon McGregor

On a single sleepy day on a street in a town in the North of England, ordinary people are going through the motions of their everyday existence - street cricket, barbecues, painting windows ... A young man is in love with a neighbour who does not even know his name. An old couple make their way up to a nearby bus stop. But then a terrible event shatters the quiet of the early summer evening, a tragedy which is not fully revealed until the end of the book.

The electric story of this street accident, an accidental pregnancy involving the narrator and a story of twins are woven invitingly across the whole but McGregor's central focus is to celebrate ordinary but nonetheless remarkable life. Through the telling of that day he brilliantly evokes the histories and lives of the largely unnamed people in the street to build up an unforgettable human panorama. A breathtakingly original, humane and moving first book. It was long listed for the Booker prize, exalted by many critics and reviled by a few. Amongst readers there were many superlatives, quite a few struggles and sometimes both. Some struggled with the lack of names or switches of time. Everyone praised the descriptive writing and the inventive play with language, finding endless snippets to delight in. The process of revisiting characters as the day unfolded, each time finding out more was applauded.

Readers connections with the story included the memory of packing up ready to leave student life behind, for another the snap shots of family life resonated with capturing impressions in notes as a social worker and the evocative descriptions of childhood transported many of us back there.

QUICK UPDATE FOLLOWING MOORLINCH CHURCH HALL AGM

Thanks to everyone who was able to come along to the Church Hall AGM on Thursday I May. We had some lively and helpful discussions about the future of the hall and how it can be managed for the village while the input from the current committee reduces. Owned by Moorlinch Church, the hall relies on fundraising, donations and help in order for us to keep it running for people to use. It costs about £3,000 a year just for bills and routine upkeep.

In the last 3 years facilities have been improved thanks to a grant from (what was then) Sedgemoor DC; the pavilion, newly completed gazebo, additional toilet, new shed, insulated ceiling and new audio system plus more. These were all based on feedback from Moorlinch villagers.

We talked a lot about how we could increase the use of the hall and help people realise it



is available for them, and also about how we can accommodate requests and try to undertake further improvements.

A PRIVILEGE TO BE INVOLVED

Rev Dr Ian Mills, Rector, Chew Valley West Benefice, reflects on the significance of life events, baptisms, weddings and funerals and shares how these sacred moments offer space for faith and connection.

Why are life events, such as weddings, baptisms and funerals so important?

Because they involve people choosing to come to the church or include the church in some way in these moments of great joy, great sorrow and vulnerability.

What does it mean to you when someone chooses the church for these life events?

It is a privilege to be involved. It means the church still holds a place in people's hearts. I also think everyone has some level of spiritual curiosity. These occasions let them explore that safely,

Why do you think people still seek God's presence at these times?

Grief, love, new life-these stir a desire for connection and meaning. I think these occasions often give people an opportunity to push at the door a little bit, it gives them an excuse to open a conversation and to explore their faithcuriosity a little bit more.

What makes a baptism such a special moment for a family?

We see families who we welcome for the first time through baptism and then we see them again over the years at school services and church events. It's a lovely journey and there is a sense that the children are growing up with the church very much a part of their journey.

How does the Church ensure people see weddings as more than just a ceremony taking place in a church? I always ask couples why they've chosen

to marry in church and we discuss their different journeys together. One couple both worked and lived in Glasgow and didn't have a local link, but wanted to marry in one of our churches. To do that, they needed to worship here for six months. At first, I worried they would see it merely as a legal hurdle to jump over, but over time, it became something they really valued. They still talk appreciatively about establishing a connection with the parish here.

Why do funerals touch people so deeply and sometimes stir questions of faith? We have had many families who have been bereaved and received pastoral care from the church. Over time, some have found their way back. Perhaps their faith or church attendance had lapsed, but the process of reconnecting through their bereavement gave them a reason to return.

CHRIST BESIDE US IN THE JOYS AND SORROWS OF LIFE

One of the great gifts of the Church, and to the Church, is the way in which we are invited to share in the significant life events of our communities. As we share in baptisms, confirmations and weddings, there is a great opportunity for us to be a part of people's real lives in real ways.

A key moment in the Christian journey is the moment of Baptism. John Chrysostom in the 4th century said, "When we immerse our head in water, just as if in a grave, the old man is buried and having sunk down, is entirely hidden once for all; that, when we emerge, a new man arise again. Just as it is easy for us to be immersed and to emerge, so it is easy for God to bury the old man and raise up the new."

For Christians baptism is important as it puts us in the place of Christ and we start a new

way of life. We become part of Christ's body. Titus 3.5 describes baptism as "the laver of regeneration"; it is an antitype of the Exodus (as we see in 1 Cor 10.1-2). It is us being born again from above (John 3.5). Above all, Baptism is the giving of the Spirit - which is the principle of the Christian Life.

It is our entire life, and indeed death, which are united in the death and resurrection of Christ. In Baptism we are united to God by adoption, having access to the divine life. And in Baptism we find ways of sustaining ourselves on the journey of life. As Lancelot Andrewes put it, "By Him taught all our life long that we know not, put in mind of what we forget, stirred up in what we are dull, helped in our prayers, relieved in our infirmities, comforted in our heaviness".
