SKY AT NIGHT - July

Planets

Mars sets in the west at 11pm quite faint and star-like, then at 11.30pm Saturn again faint and star-like appears in the east. Early morning at 2am Venus can be seen shining as it rises in the east, followed by another bright object - the planet Jupiter.

Constellation

Late evening during the last couple of weeks of July find a flat clear southern horizon so you can get a good view of the Constellation of Sagittarius. On first glance this area may appear to be quite cloudy but this is in fact clouds of stars as we are looking toward the centre and

most dense part of our Milky Way galaxy. The stars of Sagittarius form a teapot shaped asterism complete with handle, lid and spout. From a really dark location steam appears to be coming out of the spout, an illusion caused by a mass of stars in this direction. **Phenomena:** On the morning of 22 July before dawn the waning crescent Moon appears with Jupiter to the left and Venus to the right, the three brightest objects in the

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. From the middle of June, the expected weather is hay making weather. Unfortunately, in the cereal fields what we need is rain. Lack of it will mean a smaller harvest. It is likely that prices will also be lower as a result of the trade deal with the Americans which will allow in an amount of bioethanol equivalent to our annual production. This will close the only plant we have making this green fuel from cereals. That represents a loss of a market to cereal growers. Jobs will also be lost at the plant. July is the time to prepare for the winter barley and oil seed rape harvest. The goats have now gone and the lambs are growing well. Livestock tend to grow well

Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Moorlinch, Stawell, Sutton Mallet and Greinton

Hello everyone,

When I was elected last July, I wanted to focus on specific health issues, including the chronic health condition known as ME. Thank you to those who've shared the reality of living with this condition. I wrote to the Health Secretary asking him to fund research for both ME and Long Covid sufferers. I was delighted that all 71 of my MP colleagues signed the letter, which I delivered just before World ME Day.

On the Justice Committee, our Report on the Criminal Cases Review Commission reveals it's an organisation needing complete root and branch reform. Our next focus is on ending the cycle of reoffending through better prisoner rehabilitation and resettlement.

Celebrating World Cider Day served as a great reminder of all that's good and vibrant about this special area – not least, its people! I run many 'surgeries' in wonderful independent coffee shops and village pubs. If you'd like to speak to me, please come and chat.

Ashley Fox, MP for Middlezoy and Othery

I recently met with Paul, who runs Styles Menswear in Eastover. After years serving Bridgwater, he's now facing a £6,000 increase in business rates - and that's before we even get to the catastrophic impact of the roadworks outside his door.

Over the period of a year, footfall in Bridgwater has dropped by more than 400,000 and the most recent figures show that decline isn't going away. In the first quarter of this year alone, footfall fell from 547,484 to 465,164 compared to the same period last year. That's over 80,000 fewer people coming into town to do their shopping, have a coffee, or enjoy a meal - and local businesses are feeling every bit of that loss.

Since December, when Somerset Council first announced the full Eastover closure, I've urged them to rethink. I've written repeatedly to raise concerns, met with affected businesses, and applied pressure for proper support. When I learned that Somerset Council had doubled pavement licence fees - right in the middle of prolonged disruption - I called for those charges to be waived. It was an unfair kick in the teeth to some businesses already struggling to survive, and I made it clear that some form of compensation or relief was essential.

And it's not just Bridgwater that feels the strain. This chaos doesn't stop at the town boundary. Poorly managed road closures and diversion routes often drive traffic straight through rural villages. The result? Congestion, damaged roads, and disruption to daily life. Too often, residents are left to deal with last-minute works and poor communication from the Council.

I will continue to stand with our traders and residents. I'll keep fighting for practical support and I will keep speaking up - because we deserve better.

GREINTON PARISH CHURCH

St Michael and All Angels

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting was held on 19 May. Church finances and the physical state of the church, which has just been subject to a 5-yearly survey, were the main topics of discussion.

Although the church building is in reasonable condition, the church architect assesses that works costing about £300,000 will be required within the next 10 years. Everyone at the meeting agreed that there was very little prospect of us being able to raise that sort of money and grant funding would be difficult to get with such a small congregation - there are only five people on the church's electoral roll and the Parochial Church Council (PCC) consists of just three people, soon to reduce to two.

Therefore, with great sadness, the PCC has concluded that the church must close as a Church of England place of worship and the Diocese of Bath and Wells has been informed of this.

This does not mean that the church building will close immediately or for ever. It is likely that we will be able to continue using the church as we have done over recent years (Harvest Celebration, Remembrance, Christmas Singalong etc), at least until the

This year's Week of Prayer will focus on different ages and stages. Churches, schools, small groups and individuals are encouraged to join in praying for the children and young people in our communities.


If desired a daily prayer guide and video put together by the diocesan Go Team can be downloaded from the website.
